The Great Fire of London started on Sunday 2nd September 1666.

The fire started in a bakery on Pudding Lane.

The fire spread because it had been hot, dry and windy; the wind spread the fire quicker.

In 1666, the buildings in London were very close together and many were made of wood and had straw rooves. This helped the fire to spread.

The fire ended on Thursday 6th September 1666.

After the fire, many buildings were rebuilt. King Charles II ordered that buildings were built further apart and made of stone to make sure the fire could not happen again so easily.

In 1666 there was no fire brigade.

Samuel Pepys wrote about the fire in his diary; this is how we know so much about what happened.

After the fire, thousands of people were homeless.
